By distance we code if the MP in his/her post describes a party decision or party policy she/he does not agree with. The decision may be taken by the party organization, the party leader or a party minister, and it may relate to policies as well as organizational issues.

C: POLICY ORIENTED POSTS

C1: Does the post include a political message?

This includes all statements with a political substance, but excludes messages solely related to non-political matters such as birthdays or personal experiences. Also, the message can express a political attitude directly or indirectly, so for instance a message saying “Thank you Lystrup School for a nice visit” does not count as a political message, but if the message is followed up with a political statement eg. “let’s unite to secure good education for all” it should be coded as political. Further, political messages can comment on political processes and practices such as: “The government does not do what it takes to make the parties cooperate”

This relates to activities not directly related to the tasks of a MP. For instance reports on the MPs exercise/sports, attending children's hobbies, housekeeping etc.

3: Reliability Test (performed in June 2017)

To perform the reliability test we draw a random sample of 500 units from the posts collected in October, November, December and February. The posts collected in January were not included, since the coding of these was not finalized at the time of the reliability test. Two student coders performed the original coding. One of these student coders performed the reliability test three months after finishing the February coding.

Two types of reliability tests are implemented. First, the percentage of disagreement and second, a kappa estimation, which take agreement by chance into account. For B7, B9 and B11 we used a weighed kappa to take the ordinal scale of the coding values into account. We use the following scheme (Table 1) for evaluating the reliability of the coding

The coding of Spokesmanship (A2 Position) include up to 10 values ascribed to A2a-j respectively. Multiple spokesmanships may not be registered in the exact same order, which will lead to high disagreement and low kappa values even though the same and correct spokesmanships may be registered. Moreover, spokesmanships change relatively frequent making the reliability test problematic. Since the coding consist of typing in information from the parliamentary website and does not involve any evaluation or judgement, we do not expect this variable to suffer from low reliability.

An overview of the coding reliability is provided in table 2.
